

## Letter to George L. Conyngham, 25 March 1858

My Dear Sir

We have been going  
at the rate of 200 miles  
a day ever since we  
left Liverpool on the  
10<sup>th</sup> and are now in  
glorious summer weather  
pitying the natives we  
have left behind in  
their miserable frost  
and snow - We go  
into Sierra Leone  
today and will get  
nicely thawed out

after all the chills we  
endured in England  
The Pearl has done  
her duty nicely and  
the captain, a good  
man, is thoroughly  
up to his duty -  
My companions  
seem all men of  
of the right stamp and  
I am thankful  
to a kind Providence  
for favouring us  
thus far. When we  
have waled we  
proceed to the Cape.  
I enclose to

you a packet of

be kind enough to  
forward to their destinations  
Any expense you  
may incur will be  
paid by M<sup>r</sup> Coult &c  
We are not late enough  
to send home a certificate  
of life for this  
quarter but we shall  
do it at the Cape  
Will you be kind  
enough to let M<sup>r</sup> Elliott  
know that M<sup>r</sup> Duncan  
has furnished us with  
a most excellent  
captain - very few  
equal him in knowledge  
of his work. He formerly  
commanded one of the  
large New York steamers

We hope to be at the  
Zambesi by the first  
of May. The Colonial  
Office have acted from  
first to last in the  
most handsome way  
to us and I am sure  
I feel grateful

I am so sorry that  
we did not arrange the  
insurance so that we  
could have gone in to  
Loanda. I would have  
sent a specimen of the  
Angola coffee which  
would have pleased you  
more than beetles bugs  
& cockroaches, it is the  
finest I ever tasted and  
I wish it were known  
at home. Accept of my  
heartly thanks for all
