

# Letter to Commander of Her Majesty's Ship, 31 May 1859

Shupanga 31<sup>st</sup> May

1859

To The

Commander of

Her Majestys Ship -

Sir

I took the liberty  
of applying to Admiral  
Sir Frederick Grey about  
the beginning of the present  
year for some salt provisions  
for our crew and the  
Expedition, and hoped that  
it would be in the Admiral's  
power to send a vessel  
with them to the Mouth of  
the Kongone on the 24<sup>th</sup>  
May, but no ship appearing

on that day either the Kongone  
or Luabo mouths of the Zambesi  
I conclude that my letter may  
may have been detained in the way  
or that the service required  
all the ships elsewhere - We  
buried a bottle on the island  
in the entrance to Kongone  
harbour ten yards Magnetic  
North of a + cut on one  
of the supports of what was  
the flag staff containing an  
appointment for the 30<sup>th</sup>  
of July next in the same  
harbour. It contained also  
some account of our movements  
and of the discovery of a large

inland Lake to which we propose  
to return after visiting Tette.

The despatches accompanying  
this are of importance as  
the first information  
respecting the New Lake to  
our own Government  
It is scarcely necessary to  
mention this as any  
despatches committed to your  
charge will without doubt  
be carefully preserved.  
What is said in the buried  
letter is for your own  
private information and  
that of the Admiral. We say  
little to the Portuguese beyond  
the fact of having discovered  
a large Lake called Shirwa  
As yet they have made no  
pretensions to a previous knowledge  
of it

We have had some fever  
but of a mild form  
D<sup>r</sup> Kirk and I have escaped  
I have the honour to be
